







Growth Impacts on Traffic

Transportation Mode Split: All Daily Trips




Travel Trends by Mode and Corridor

Share (%) of trips to Arlington that are drive alone trips and Drive/Ride with Others trips, by Arlington planning area of destination


Transit and Walk Trips to Arlington Planning Areas

Share (%) of trips to Arlington that are transit trips and walk trips, by Arlington planning area of destination







 The County continues to invest in multimodal transportation to support sustainable growth in Crystal City and Pentagon City

Reducing Vehicular Traffic in Arlington Ridge

 While development has more than doubled in 22202 since 1980, the average weekday daily traffic volume trend for the locations counted within majority-residential neighborhoods is below levels observed in 1980







- Report A Problem is the County's application for reporting many kinds of community issues, including several types of transportation concerns
 - Street lights
 - Traffic signs
 - Blocked sidewalk or street
 - Bus stop maintenance
 - Streets maintenance
 - Trails maintenance
 - Transportation Investigations

What is a transportation investigation?

DES Transportation Engineering & Operations staff review community-reported concerns about safety, speeding, crosswalks, sight distances and more.

These investigations can result in safety interventions to address issues reported by residents and documented by staff.
